

She has been busy spinning and noted that the Alpaca doesn't take up dye as easily as wool.

Pam showed her very smart entrelac hat and scarf. She also showed a large ANZAC themed rug which had the colours of the forces and a poppy in one corner. She has also been winning prizes at the Holbrook show. Well done Pam!

Ann has very cleverly made a tension board for plying from bobbins. She adapted the layout of an Ashford one and added her own touches. Very effective.

Kathy showed the results of several different ways of washing a raw fleece. She is doing it in a very scientific way so we enjoyed seeing the samples washed in different ways particularly the suint method.

Batts, Tops, Rovings - what is the difference?

It can be confusing understanding the terminology associated with spinning. I found this explanation in the Spin-off Magazine, Winter 2011, it had come from *The Encyclopedia of Handspinning* by Mabel Ross (interweave, 1988)

Batt A sheet of carded wool taken from a hand or drum carder.

Roving A long, even strand of carded or combed fibers which have been drawn out, then slightly twisted.

- Top A commercial preparation of fibers which has been carded and subsequently combed to remove the short fibers and align the long in parallel form ...a rope like strand without twist.

Fleece Washing Workshop

Rachael, Kathy and Kylie had a working day at Rachael's place trying different types of ways to wash a raw Romny x Corridale fleece.

As well as the conventional scour wash, they also tried a suint bath, where the fleece is added to a tub of rainwater and left for 7 days to "ferment". It is a self-cleaning process but it produces quite an odour, as Rachael writes in her *Ode to Suinty* below:

Suinty, suinty we love you so, Suinty, suinty you have to go, Suinty you have made a stench, U even made my friend Mark retch! U have done a great job on the fleece, But your time on this planet really must cease.

Dyeing Day November 18th

As usual a lot of fun was had by all. As well as our usual dyehards we had a number of members new to dyeing who became quite enthusiastic and eager to try themselves.

We had pots simmering skeins with Landscape Dyes, while the microwave was working over-time with rainbow hues of acid dyes and food colouring. There was a wok simmering English Leicester and alpaca fleece in Logwood natural dye, and jars solar dyeing fleece in liquid derived from avocado seeds and skins.

We will probably run more Dyeing Days in 2016 to cater for the interest, and to teach the basics to newcomers.
