Show. Many people stopped to admire the skill and work involved but the most ardent admirer was a toddler who dragged her grandmother back 3 times to see "the birdies".

Ann: is knitting another pair of socks. **Kylie:** showed a new beanie she made together with the Addi Click Lace Set of needles she recently purchased.




A Christmas Gnome

Weave a 2x2 for a nose. Add running stitch and gather the edge to make a ball. Put in stuffing, stitch to top of body. Add the hat and stitch in place. Add soft white yorn or roving for beard.




Let's go continental
