Renovation of Guild Rooms

The Guild was established in 1970 and previously met at the CWA Hall in Kiewa St Albury. In 1983, the Guild moved into the grandstand building at the Albury Showground in conjunction with the Albury Show Society and the Ladies Auxiliary. 1994 saw double doors installed to give access to Harness Racing room. Since the rooms have been built, there has been no renovation work done. Since then the rooms continue to be used by an ever increasing membership. The Guild members feel that the rooms could do with a freshen up.

Permission was sought by the Albury Showground Trust and a letter of support received.

Following the October 2018 meeting, where this project was suggested, the current President, drew up a list of priorities for the members to number in order of importance. At the October 2018 Meeting it was determined to:

- replace the very old carpet with lino
- plaster walls to be painted need cracks repaired
- walls & doors painted neutral, consistent colour
- Air conditioner to be replaced
- old air conditioner unit removed by volunteer members
- members to clear & clean rooms prior to work being undertaken

January 2019

ACC grant applied for by members - Vivien Naimo, Heather Mulqueeney (President), Ann Leonard (Treasurer) submitted grant

Grant was approved and we received \$5,720.00 from ACC & a further \$2,000 from the Albury Showground Trust

July 2019, planned commencement of works. Supervised by committee members.

- the old Air conditioner was removed and the hole plastered up on the inside and bricked on the inside by two husband volunteers
- walls throughout painted
- carpet removed & new lino laid
- bookshelves painted & books catalogued
- new curtains
- new loom covers
- new cupboards in the kitchen
- two looms sold which has given more space.

November 2019 Acquittal completed and submitted on completion of works.

The Guild continues to attract new members and the refreshed rooms would be more comfortable and aesthetically appealing to all, especially the older members. Lino will be easier to clean and maintain and a new quieter and more efficient Air Con will be welcomed by all members.

The knowledge acquired at the Guild's weekly meetings is generously shared with

the wider community through the many events that members attend - the International Scarf Exchange, demonstrating at local libraries, agricultural shows/nursing homes/festivals/street stalls and craft fairs.

Keeping Our work rooms clean.

There is a list on the notice board of tasks that can be done weekly, monthly and annually that will keep our kitchen, bathrooms and work areas clean. When you see a job that needs doing, please attend to it and sign off on the list, alternatively you might like to "claim" a job for a month or two or the year. If so please indicate that you have it covered on the list.Thanks.

16th & 17th October Weaving Workshop - On the 16th & 17th

of October a group of our members took part in a fantastic weaving workshop with Elizabeth Calnan and her husband Bruce. Elizabeth's knowledge on weaving was exceptional and her teaching practice was to be commended.

Our participants ranged from the experienced weaver, those with little experience to a couple with no experience at all. By the end of the two days everyone was a lot more comfortable with weaving terminology and there wasn't as many "thingees and whatsees".

We practiced many styles of finger manipulated weaves and we all had our favourite and not so favourite styles. The styles that we learnt were Leno, which included some laces, inlay, dukagang (straight little paths in the cloth), bouttone (loops), bouquets, Danish medallions, Spanish lace, Soumak, ghiordes knot and chaining. Some of the styles had variations like splits and double.

Most of the time there was the usual banter, but for some of the more difficult styles the room was deafly quiet due to intense concentration.

We would also like to thank Heather and Robyn for being our kitchen ladies and made sure we all had a cuppa when needed! They also prepared our morning tea and lunches as well as cleaning and packing up afterwards, it was very much appreciated.

Fun with Numbers ...

Fibonacci sequence for stripes in knitting, weaving etc.:

1, 1, 2, 3, 5, 8, 13, 21, 34, 55 ...

Each number in the sequence is the sum of the two preceding numbers.

The theory is that using the numbers in the sequence to define the width of a stripe creates the illusion of a random pattern that's visually appealing.

You can limit your design to the first few numbers in the sequence; you don't have to continue increasing the width of the stripe.

Have a play and see how Fibonacci numbers work out. Also give Hailstone numbers a try!

Hailstone Numbers

Start with any positive integer (an *initial seed*) and obtain a sequence of numbers by following these rules.

- 1. If the current number is even, divide it by two; else if it is odd, multiply it by three and add one.
- 2. Repeat.

Let's try a few numbers to see what happens:

n=3; 10, 5, 16, 8, 4, 2, 1, 4, 2, 1, ...

n=4; 2, 1, 4, 2, 1, ...

n=5; 16, 8, 4, 2, 1, 4, 2, 1, ...

n=6; 3, 10, 5, 16, 8, 4, 2, 1, 4, 2, 1, ...

n=7; 22, 11, 34, 17, 52, 26, 13, 40, 20, 10, 5, 16, 8, 4, 2, 1, 4, 2, 1, ...

Hmmn... does every initial seed yield a sequence that eventually hits 1 (and then repeats: 4,2,1,4,2,1,...)?

The *Collatz conjecture* says yes, but this has never been proved. However, it has been shown true for every number ever tried! The numbers in such sequences bounce up and down, which is why they are sometimes called "hailstone numbers".
