Audrey showed some home spun, hand knitted and hand dyed leaves for our nest. She had also dyed some plaits of wool with coffee which will go into the nest.

Rhonda discussed the Alpaca section at the Wodonga show. Kathy, Julie and Rhonda were all very much involved in showing and organizing the event.

Kathy showed a 9 stranded plait of wool roving for the nest. She also had a skein and fleece of alpaca which was dyed with River Red gum bark. The colour was a beautiful rose/mushroom shade. She also showed the superb needle felted Gouldian finches.

Alison showed some lovely, finely crocheted items that her grandmother had done. There was also a mitred square blanket done by Marie. Also on the crochet theme was a cute cat rug and an interesting crochet shroat which could be worn in different ways.

Liz showed a nuno felted scarf in subtle pink tones. It was made of silk and merino. She is currently knitting a jacket using wool from her own alpacas which has been commercially spun.

Pam has been knitting cute chickens which hold an Easter egg inside.

Faye had dyed some skeins of wool in beautiful earthy shades using chestnut and walnuts. Faye also has an 18 inch loom for sale.

Debbie had finished a sweet little knitted boys vest as well as 2 knitted berets. She also brought in a very smart intarsia jumper with a hearts and cat design which she had knitted many years ago for her daughter.

Heather has been experimenting with the spindling and showed some very finely spun yarn using a very small spindle. She has finished a very handsome cabled jumper.

Ruth finally finished a guitar strap which was done in gold and black cotton on the inkle loom in a celtic design.

This year's theme is "A Riot of Colour inspired by Australian Native Birds" and the 2014 Featured Breed is merino.

Our entry birds nest is being worked on and we'd love your contributions. Knitted, crocheted, felted or woven. Any technique of working with wool is welcome.

Pick your favourite Australian bird, take it's colours in merino wool or roving (or merino blend) and create an egg or two for our nest, or flowers to decorate it! Stark black and whites from our magpies and Willy Wag Tails, add a splash of vibrant red for our winter Robin Red Breasts or a kaleidoscope of colours like our Rosellas and Lorikeets. Nature had a marvelous way of blending colours and there's bound to be a combination that appeals to you!

Any size would do, after all birds eggs come in a wide range of sizes. So pick something that is comfortable for you to work with. A chicken's egg is a good reference. And keep samples and notes of your materials to add to our entry worksheet.
